

## **Board Meeting Minutes**

#### NARBC Board Meeting March 16, 2025

The Board of Directors met on Sunday, March 16, 2025, via a Microsoft Teams Meeting. President Jen Richardson called the meeting to order at 5:10 pm EST. Board members present were Jen Richardson, June Abbott, Lauren Cody, Andrea Evans, Casey Jones, Tammy Vaughn, Madison Wisecup, Laurie Penterman and Jackie McDonald.

**Secretary Meeting Minutes-** The Board members were provided with a copy of the meeting minutes from the February 12, 2025 board meeting. A MOTION was made by Tammy Vaughn to approve the meeting minutes. The motion was SECONDED by Lauren Cody. Motion CARRIED.

**Status of Membership-** Laurie Penterman reported that we currently have 361 members in the club, 295 being Open members, and 66 Youth members. Since our February meeting, the club has gained one new Open member and two new Youth members. Ten Open members and two Youth members renewed their membership since the last meeting. Laurie continues to send out renewal notices to expiring members via email.

**Financial Report-** June Abbott reported that the balance in the checking account is \$3.287.73, there is \$31,942.98 in the money market account, and we have a balance of \$249.47 in the PayPal account, for a total cash balance of \$35,480.18. There is \$2,215.14 in the held funds, so there are \$33,265.02 available funds.

#### **Old Business**

**Boutique- Victory Pass Originals-** The Victory Pass Originals can set up a store for NARBC apparel to be sold on their website. They charge a \$25 set-up fee, and then our club will make \$3 per item sold, which will be paid to us through PayPal four times a year. We send them the NARBC logo and also the logos from the National Angora Shows and the Angora shows at the ARBA Conventions. Victory Pass Originals takes the orders, puts them together and ships them, so they do all the work and no one in the club has to hold onto inventory. We can put something on our website with a link to Victory Pass Originals. Yvonne Lyons said she would be the point person for all of this. A MOTION was made by June Abbott to have NARBC pay the \$25 set-up fee to Victory Pass Originals and have them set up a store on their website to sell NARBC apparel. The motion was SECONDED by Lauren Cody. Motion CARRIED.

The 2025 Angora National Show Update: Sandy Berger: Banquet- Sandy Berger signed a contract with NARBC to prepare the banquet meal of a taco bar at the Angora National Show in Decatur, Illinois on Saturday, April 19, which will be a luncheon. According to the contract, the meal cost is \$20 per person, and a \$150 deposit was paid to Sandy. Things have changed, as Sandy Berger is now making a taco bar for everyone that attends the show at a cost of \$15 per person. The contract between NARBC and Sandy Berger will be voided, Sandy will refund NARBC the \$150 deposit, and a refund will be given to those members who have already paid.

#### **New Business**

#### **Tammy Vaughn's Proposals:**

- 1. NARBC Mentoring Committee Proposal- The purpose of the NARBC Mentoring Committee serves as a welcoming bridge for new members, ensuring they feel supported, informed and engaged from the moment they join the National Angora Rabbit Breeders Club. The responsibilities of the mentoring committee would include reaching out to new NARBC members via email, message of social media shortly after joining the club. Also to connect new members to NARBC resources such as introducing them to various NARBC Facebook pages, ensure youth members are made aware of available NARBC youth programs such as Bunny Bucks, and connecting new members to the NARBC District Directors and any Angora Specialty Clubs in their area. Finally, fostering a supportive and engaging community including encouraging new members to ask questions, seek mentorship and participate in NARBC discussions.
- 2. NARBC Mentoring Facebook Rules, Facebook Policy and Procedure, and Facebook Admin Responsibilities- The goal of the NARBC Mentoring Facebook page is to create a supportive and positive environment where everyone feels comfortable asking questions and learning from one another. This includes that this page is exclusively for current NARBC members, kindness is key, no promotional posts, utilize the FAQ page, respect admin accessibility, and promotion of the NARBC Guidebook.
- 3. NARBC Districts 1-4 Facebook Rules- This is a friendly space where NARBC members, both adults and youth, can come together to ask questions, share experiences, and learn about all aspects of raising Angora rabbits. Members can share photos of their show wins, exchange ideas, ask questions and support one another.

All board members should study Tammy's proposals, and we will discuss them at next month's meeting.

**Photos in District Articles-** It says in the PPM that for a \$5 fee you can have a picture of your Best in Show or Reserve in Show win published in The Angora News. Some of the District Directors want to post pictures of people from their districts who have won BIS or RIS as part of their articles in The Angora News. After much discussion, a MOTION was made by Lauren Cody to offer members the opportunity to pay \$5 to have their BIS or RIS pictures guaranteed to be published in The Angora News, or they can send their BIS or RIS pictures to their District Director, and their picture may be included as part of the District Director's article in The Angora News for free. The motion was SECONDED by Andrea Evans. Motion CARRIED.

**Sweepstakes Points-** Andrea spoke to someone at Easy2show Club Software about purchasing sweepstakes software to make it easier to keep track of sanctions and sweepstakes points, and they said that we would have to use their payment system instead of people paying NARBC directly through PayPal. Andrea is creating a spreadsheet to show how points are calculated and to help improve point calculation accuracy.

Follow Up on Judges for Future Conventions- Laurie reported that Rachel Penterman cannot judge Angoras at the 2025 ARBA Convention because she committed to judging Mini Lops first, and they will be judged at the same time as the Angoras. Laurie reached out to Steven Buell to see if he was available to judge the Angoras, and he replied back that he was available. Laurie informed Dave Cardinal and Dave sent Steven a contract, which he signed. We are still in need of one judge for both the 2026 and the 2027 ARBA Convention, otherwise we have two judges committed through 2030.

**Convention and National Show Photos-** Jen would like the club to "hire" someone to take photos of the Angora winners at the ARBA Convention and the National Angora Show. We would not pay them a huge amount, maybe \$50. We just need someone who is responsible for taking pictures of all the winners, so we have the pictures to put on the website and in The Angora News. Jen will make a Facebook post asking for people who are interested in doing this for a nominal fee.

A MOTION to adjourn the meeting was made by Casey Jones. The motion was SECONDED by Jackie McDonald. The meeting was adjourned at 7:02 pm EST. Our next meeting will be held on Thursday, April 10, 2025, at 7:30 pm EST via Microsoft Teams. The purpose of this meeting is in place for the 2025 National Angora Show in Decatur, Illinois on April 19.

#### NARBC Board Meeting April 10, 2025

The Board of Directors met on Thursday, April 10, 2025, via Microsoft Teams. President Jen Richardson called the meeting to order at 7:34 pm EST. Board members present were Jen Richardson, June Abbott, Andrea Evans, Laurie Penterman, Jackie McDonald, Madison Wisecup and Tammy Vaughn.

The purpose of this meeting is to make sure everything is in place for the National Angora Show in Decatur, Illinois on April 19. This is what was discussed:

- 1. Andrea ordered tablecloths for the raffle tables. We have reserved 4 tables.
- 2. The raffle table should be set up on Friday as soon as possible.
- 3. The raffle table and photo booth will be close to the Angora judging table.
- 4. For the silent auction, donors should write what the starting bid should be for the items they brought.
- 5. The judging order will be Youth French, Satin, English and Giant, followed by Open French, Satin, English and Giant.
- 6. Pictures of the winners will be taken after each breed is judged.
- 7. Pictures of the exhibitors of each breed will be taken by the photo booth, then a group picture of all of the exhibitors.
- 8. Andrea ordered small, blue notebooks with the National Show logo as thank you gifts for all Angora exhibitors.
- 9. Vanessa is putting the WSG information on the NARBC Facebook page.
- 10. Going forward, having an all-breed club hosting the National Angora Show should be considered to be an option if no Angora specialty club volunteers to host it.
- 11. So far there have been fifteen Angora clothing items purchased from Victory Pass Originals. Eleven of these are National Show items, the other four are NARBC items. The National Show clothing items will remain on the website for people to purchase for awhile after the National Show is over.
- 12. Bob Donnell has been great to work with.
- 13. Jen's husband Aaron has been working on making show coops for this year's National Angora Show. There will be 15 holes, each hole is 18 X 18" with 16 X 16" doors. Aaron and Jen are donating these coops to the Rabbit Renegades Club when the National Show is over, as the Rabbit Renegades are also hosting the 2025 ARBA Convention. Jen is going to find out if these coops can be stored in the ARBA trailer along with some risers. We can't expect a NARBC member to store and haul these coops to all of the National and ARBA Convention shows. Maybe we could pay ARBA a storage fee to store them?
- 14. National Show breed and exhibitor numbers will be posted on the NARBC Facebook page after the entry deadline.
- 15. Sandy Berger will bring the \$150 the club paid as a deposit for the Angora Banquet taco bar and give it to June since the taco bar will be for all the exhibitors at the show.
- 16. The raffle will close at 2:00 and the silent auction will close at 3:00. Andrea will ask Bob Donnell if alcohol is allowed in the raffle.
- 17. If anyone at the show asks about sweepstakes points, tell them that they are in process and it's taking time. The goal is to have it updated by the end of April. The spreadsheet will not only tell sweepstakes points, but it will also have each exhibitor's sweeps calculations including each show, date, number of rabbits, etc.

A MOTION to adjourn the meeting was made by Andrea Evans. The motion was SECONDED by Jackie McDonald. The meeting was adjourned at 8:13 pm EST. Our next meeting will be held on Sunday, April 27, 2025, at 5:00 pm EST via Microsoft Teams.

**Secretary Meeting Minutes-** The Board members were provided with a copy of the meeting minutes from the March 16, 2025, and the April 10, 2025, board meetings. A MOTION was made by Tammy Vaughn to approve the meeting minutes. The motion was SECONDED by Casey Jones. Motion CARRIED.

**Status of Membership-** Laurie Penterman reported that we currently have 333 members in the club, 267 being Open members, and 66 Youth members. Thirty-three memberships expired on February 28. Since our March meeting, the club has gained two new Open members and no new Youth members. Seven Open members and two Youth members renewed their membership since the last meeting. Laurie continues to send out renewal notices to expiring members via email.

**Financial Report-** June Abbott reported that the balance in the checking account is \$2,299.95, there is \$32,002.72 in the money market account, and we have a balance of \$646.92 in the PayPal account, for a total cash balance of \$34,949.59. Emily Ashton did a fine job judging the WSG Contest and thank you to Giovanna Harris for writing for Emily. Lynn Galbraith-Wilson was awarded the President's Award from our President, Jen Richardson. Because Sandy Berger had to cancel having her taco bar lunch for everyone due to not having a permit, the club decided to provide pizza for the Angora attendees. Everyone seemed to have a good time.

**Tammy Vaughn's Mentorship Proposals-** Tammy emailed the board members a color-coded updated Mentorship Proposal.

- 1. The words highlighted in blue replace the NARBC Mentoring Group Facebook page's description.
- 2. The words highlighted in yellow replace the NARBC Mentoring Group Facebook page's rules.
- 3. The words highlighted in pink will be the featured post on the NARBC Mentoring Groups Facebook page.
- 4. The words highlighted in green will be added to the NARBC Policies and Procedures Manuel.
- 5. A blurb will be added to the welcome letter to new members that Laurie sends along with their membership card. This blurb will include information on how to contact the members of the Mentoring Committee.
- 6. The Mentoring Committee will meet once a month to see if any new members have reached out. Rachel, Tammy and Madison had a Zoom meeting, and they are all on board. These three are the administrators of the NARBC Mentoring Facebook page. Other people on the committee are moderators.
- 7. A MOTION was made by Andrea Evans to accept Tammy's Mentoring Proposals. The motion was SECONDED by Casey Jones. Motion CARRIED.

**Follow Up on Judges for Future Conventions-** We are still in need of one judge for the 2026 and one judge for the 2027 ARBA Conventions. Casey Jones suggested some judges. We will reach out and see who's available.

**Convention Photos-** Jen made a post on the NARBC Facebook page that we were looking for someone to take pictures of the winning Angoras at the ARBA Convention. Madison Wisecup was the only person to respond, so Madison will take photos at the 2025 ARBA Convention in Indianapolis.

#### **New Business**

**Sweepstakes-** Graham Thomas, Andrea and Jen have been working on sweepstakes. Deb Clemens, our Sanctions Chair, has done a great job putting things in folders. Andrea made an amazing spreadsheet which takes the info from the show report. Each breed and each exhibitor have their own tab, and if there's an issue, the report can be sent to the exhibitor. Andrea used AI to make the spreadsheet, and it takes human error out. This is almost complete. There has been a lot of imputing, but it's easy to work with. Vanessa Rich should be given this spreadsheet for the WSG sweepstakes.

**Division of WSG and Commercial Fiber-** Jen received a call from Vanessa Rich asking if the WSG sweepstakes and the Commercial Fiber sweepstakes could be divided into two separate committees. Vanessa will be the WSG Sweepstakes Committee Chair, and Tammy Vaughn will be the Commercial Fiber Chair.

#### Addition of Committees- Jen would like to add two committees:

- 1. History Committee
- 2. Youth Royalty Contest Committee.

#### Removal of Committees- Jen would like to remove two committees:

- RHD Committee- There are no longer any restrictions for showing Angoras due to RHD. People can show at their own risk. It's good to have an RHD point person, but a committee is unnecessary.
- 2. Genetics Committee- Betty Chu is this committee. Perhaps we can have a report in the newsletter or republish Betty's blogs?

**Notebook Challenge-** Madison sent the board members her proposal for an Angora youth contest that could provide an opportunity for all NARBC Youth to participate that is both educational and fun regardless of their location. The NARBC Youth that choose to participate in this contest will complete a notebook in one of three age categories, documenting all records the youth choose to keep track of. For example, the number of litters produced, ailments that have negatively impacted their Angoras, or common maintenance that the youth perform on a daily basis. The more detailed the notebook the better. The winners of the NARBC Notebook Challenge will be announced at the ARBA Convention each year and awards will be presented to them. If the winners cannot attend the ARBA Convention, their awards will be mailed to them. All board members will review Madison's proposal, and we will discuss it at next month's meeting.

A MOTION to adjourn the meeting was made by Casey Jones. The motion was SECONDED by Tammy Vaughn. The meeting was adjourned at 6:45 pm EST. Our next meeting will be held on Sunday, May 18, 2025, at 5:00 pm EST via Microsoft Teams.



As we are looking forward to our fall shows, our fall coats are starting to grow, and keeping our Angoras cool is imperative.

# Beat the Heat: Keeping Your Angoras Cool This Summer! Breathe Easy with Good Airflow

Make sure your rabbitry or hutch has solid ventilation. Whether you're using fans, open windows with secure screens, or a barn with cross-breezes, moving air is a must. Heat plus still air is a no-go for fluffy buns!

**Create a Cool Retreat -** Shade is your best friend. Use shade cloth, umbrellas, or even tall potted plants to block out direct sun. Keep it breezy and dim—your rabbits will thank you.

**Chill Out with Frozen Water Bottles -** Pop water bottles in the freezer and place them (securely) in your rabbit's space. Buns love to cuddle up to them! Just watch for any chewing behavior—some bunnies think everything is a chew toy.

Cool Ceramic Trick - Refrigerated ceramic tiles are magical on hot days. Rotate them in and out of the fridge to offer your rabbits a refreshing place to sprawl. Pro tip: keep backups ready to swap out!

**Hydration is Non-Negotiable -** Always provide clean, cool water. Ice cubes in the water bowl? Yes, please! Dehydration is dangerous and can happen fast in the heat.

**Grooming Goals -** Stay on top of your grooming schedule. Keeping your Angora in a clean, mat-free coat helps them stay cooler. A light summer trim might also be a good idea, depending on your grooming goals and show schedule. My show Giants love their summer belly trims, while keeping the top and sides to grow for the fall shows.

Mind the Clock - Skip the midday heat and plan any outside time for early morning or late evening. And if your rabbit is indoors, a well-placed fan or a little A/C can go a long way (just avoid direct drafts).

Want More Cool Tips? - Be sure to check out the July/August 2023 issue of Domestic Rabbits! It has some excellent articles on heat safety and how to recognize signs of heat stroke.



### Mentoring Committee - Grooming Angora Rabbits By Rachel Penterman

I'd like to focus this Mentoring Committee Report on grooming Angora rabbits. Newcomers need to be welcomed with guidance and tips about grooming Angora rabbits because it can certainly be intimidating. Starting with angoras at the age of eleven, I can honestly say that grooming regiments are the number one thing that I wish I knew more in-depth from the get-go. I learned from reading Angora books and from experience. All these grooming tips and tricks that I'm about to write about have worked well for me.

Now, before we get started, a little bit about me. My name is Rachel Penterman, and I am licensed ARBA Rabbit Judge #1012. I started raising Angora rabbits at 10 years old and have worked with French Angoras, Giant Angoras, and Satin Angoras. And I now only focus on the French Angora. I absolutely tip my hat to anyone who exhibits quality English Angoras. Those coats are extensive, and the dedication that it takes to groom out coats of that magnitude is beyond admirable.



While grooming is important for any breed of rabbit; Angoras are certainly unique in the fact that the coats NEED constant care. It doesn't matter what Angora lines you own, or who "the top breeder" is. The bottom line is that Angora rabbits end up presenting the way that they are on show day and beyond because somebody put in the hard work of grooming that the others did not. I consider grooming Angoras to be part of my daily routine. It's like brushing my teeth or taking a shower. I don't get to decide that day whether it is going to happen or not, I just do it.

Now, let's talk about first coats vs regrow coats. I'm not saying that it can't be done with older coats but many of the English Angoras and Satin Angoras that are shown and do well have first coats. This means that these rabbits are typically a year old or less and are being shown in the original coat that the rabbit was born with. The coat has grown ever since birth. The guard hair that visibly protrudes over the underwool (crimp) is thinner in diameter; therefore, requiring more grooming attention with first-coated seniors. Grooming these first-coat babies starts at 8 weeks of age, focusing on the wool on the cheeks by the head, the nape of the neck, and the tail/rump areas. It is important to remember that every time you brush a coat, density is lost. It is important to be as gentle as possible when brushing. I'll typically only brush the very tips extremely gently with my slicker brush.

# Mentoring Committee - Grooming Angora Rabbits Continued By Rachel Penterman

Speaking of slicker brushes, the only slicker brush that I'll ever use is called the Doggy Man slicker brush. The larger or the smaller size works just fine, that's more personal preference.

I've used numerous slicker brushes over the years and have found the Doggy Man slicker brush to be the most effective in gentle grooming without yanking out a bunch of density. It works well for getting any pills (small mats accumulated at the guard hair, typically formed near the flank wool) out of the coat.

Grooming Blower (Left)

Using the grooming blower on first-coat juniors starts at 10-12 weeks of age. You must train an Angora to become acclimated to the grooming blower by training. A loud noise with strong wind is scary to a young rabbit, and they must become accustomed to it. My first time using a grooming blower ever on a rabbit, I will restrain them with one hand at the shoulders so that they don't run off the table (it happens). The second time, third time, and so on typically goes better and I can start blowing out the coat for longer duration, and they almost always handle it better. I blow out young first-coated juniors about one to two times a week.

The grooming blower is the number one grooming tool for those serious in showing competitive angoras. Why? Because the grooming blower will open the coat all the way to the skin without hardly invading the wool or taking out coat density. No, it is not a cheap investment. However, it's a purchase that will last you years of use. So honestly, it is an investment worth purchasing if you are serious with Angora rabbits.

# Mentoring Committee - Grooming Angora Rabbits Continued By Rachel Penterman

4-6 months of age in the first coat seniors is when they start to transition. Any coat, clipped or never clipped, transitions about every 90 days. Regardless of if the rabbit has the molting gene or not. How can you tell? They molt that normal fur right at the head. Molting face fur= pushing up more coat. So an eight- to nine-month-old first-coat senior has 3 coats stacked on top of each other. How did you keep the coats that are being pushed up in condition?? Frequent grooming!!! Once a junior reaches 4-6 months old, regardless of angora breed, that coat must be grooming AT LEAST twice a week to stay in condition.

Now, why am I breaking this article down to distinguish grooming first-coats vs. Regrow coats? Because your regrow coats don't require as much work. Why? Because the guard hair that visibly protrudes above the underwool (crimp) is thicker, making less work required. Think about it, after shearing down an angora, that rabbit is naked and there isn't much to groom in those first 2 months that the coat is growing back. If I'm going to show a young French Angora (let's say) with a regrow coat, I'm clipping that rabbit down at roughly 12 weeks of age, or later. Again why? Because that junior will reach sexual maturity as that coat is growing, causing the wool to be denser with thicker guard hair. There is NO advantage in the standard given to a first coat senior vs a regrow coat senior. The guard hair is to protrude above the underwool (crimp) and is to be AS DENSE AS POSSIBLE. Ultimately, showing angoras comes down to a grooming competition regarding who can exhibit the most clean, well-conditioned animals while maintaining coat density. To quote the Beloved Linda Cassella- "There are NO shortcuts!"

#### Ok, so to review. Angora Rabbit Grooming tools:

- 1. \*\*\*Grooming blower\*\*\*
- 2. Doggy Man Slicker Brush (big or small size is fine)
- 3. Gilmars sci<mark>ssors for clipping out any matted ar</mark>eas or stains near the vent area.
- 4. Cornstarch or baby powder for keeping the vent and tail area clean or moisture free.
- 5. Gilmars clippers for shearing down the coats. I have had the absolute BEST luck with clipping down coats with the Gilmars Clippers. You can purchase these off Amazon. They are inexpensive, and extremely gentle on the delicate rabbit's skin.

#### **Grooming Frequently:**

- 1. PRE JUNIORS (8-12 weeks)- grooming one to two times weekly with your Doggy Man slicker brush at the cheeks, nape, and the flank wool/tail area.
- 2. Juniors (4-6 months old) in first coats- grooming with a grooming blower and the finishing with the Doggy Man Slicker Brush at the nape, cheek wool, and flank wool/tail at least 1-2 times weekly.
- 3. Seniors with a full grow back coat or a first coat- grooming at LEAST twice weekly with the grooming blower and then spot-brushing with the Doggy Man slicker brush and finishing with a gentle-tooth comb (comb optional).

# Mentoring Committee - Grooming Angora Rabbits Continued By Rachel Penterman

Some folks get all bent out of shape about cornstarch or baby powder being used in the coats. HOWEVER, it MUST be blown out. Cornstarch/baby powder is not meant to sit in a coat and saturate forever. It is meant to be applied and then blown out of the coat.



Another thing that I'd like to mention is that the underside of a rabbit is 50% of the rabbit. The belly, chest, and vent/tail area are just as important to keep groomed and maintained as the back of the rabbit. This includes trimming toenails! This also includes keeping the cages and environment clean. You absolutely cannot expect to keep a rabbit clean and do well if the rabbit is living in urine, fecal-filled environments. I clean, disinfect, and apply fresh shavings in the drop pans that my Angoras live on top of every 5 days. Think about it; that's their toilet that they're living on top of. Keep it clean!!!

Coating out a coat to its fullest potential is not something that ever happens overnight. It takes a lot of hard work, patience, perseverance, and trial/error. Your first Angora rabbit that you ever groom out will likely not be a super star showstopper, and that's okay!! Mine certainly wasn't because it's a learning process. It's a skill that takes time, patience, and experience to learn. Even when I'm sick, busy or not feeling mentally at my best, the rabbits are still out in the barn needing consistent grooming care. It's up to YOU!

# History, Color, Genetics, Education and NCAG... Here and There Broken English Angora Presentations since the 1980s

Casey is the NARBC History Chair, she loves historical stuff. To show some old stuff, here is a photo of two of us in 2010 with two of our colored does Casey's Kieran and Chu's Ava that were alternating Best In Show wins at that time.



Northern California Angora Guild has been in existence since 1982, I was a charter member, the only charter member left. Casey joined in 1993, we are the two oldies who are still active after all these years. We created a blog Northern California Angora Guild in August 2005 after an interesting show at Carol Green's home. For almost 20 years, we try to put on a post everyday, some are long and somewhat complicated but educational, some are light and fluffy but fun, and some are fillers to adhere to the routine of daily posting.

Casey told me that NARBC newsletter would like to feature some of the material that we have posted on our NCAG blog. Let's pick a topic to start. Since there is a new COD on Broken English Angora, let's go down the memory lane to see what happened in the past.

The earliest appearance of Broken English Angora at an ARBA convention was in 1987, not in flesh but in photos. See: Northern California Angora Guild: Remember When: The Early Photos of Broken English Angora 1987 was my first ARBA convention, I don't recall seeing these photos but luckily Candy Haenszel had taken a photo and shared it with me, credit to Candy.

I went to every ARBA convention from 1987 to 2019 until the COVID hit. The first time I saw the Broken English Angora in flesh was in the 1990 convention held at Tampa, FL. The presenter was Robert Smith, he presented the Broken Black. At the time the requirement was to present one color at a time, he chose the black. I did not get a chance to feel the rabbits, but I recall the presentation rabbits were not well groomed and the judges were not impressed with them, the result was a fail. I don't think I took photos of these broken black English Angoras, nothing to post. The next COD holder of Broken English Angora was Irene Burns of MI, presented at the 1995 ARBA convention at Louisville, KY. See: Northern California Angora Guild: Remember When: Presentation of Broken English Angora in 1995 At the time, there was only one name allowed on a COD. Though some including myself helped, officially Irene was the only person responsible.

The rabbits presented in 1995 were very nice and passed the first showing. I took two of the presentation does home and bred them for Irene, as you could see in Northern California Angora Guild: Remember When: Broken English Angora, the does are quite nice. After Irene Burns gave up in 1996, the next person who took out a COD was Susan Clothier originally from PA but resided in NC when she did the COD. Susan did her first showing in 2000 at the ARBA convention at Columbus, OH, see Northern California Angora Guild: Remember When: Presentation of Broken English Angora in 2000. Susan's rabbits were extremely nice, passed with high praise from the ARBA Standard Committee members. I recall there was a little scare before the rabbits went on the judging table: the junior buck was 2 ounces over the 5-1/2 pound limit. She exercised the rabbit over and over, and made the weight. A word of caution, make sure to weigh the presentation animals frequently, there is no leeway if the rabbit is underweight or overweight. As shown in the post, Susan gave up in 2001 after a dog attack killed most of her presentation animals.

The next person who took out a COD was Lynn Wilson. Her first presentation was to be done at the 2008 ARBA convention at Louisville, KY but it did not happen. Instead, Brenda Hunneshagen had her pair of Broken black English Angora on display as exhibition animals; the pair went home with Lynn to help the next showing. I am not sure whether there was a showing of Broken English Angora in 2009, I don't find any post or photos. There was for sure an attempt for the first showing in 2010 convention at Minneapolis, see

Northern California Angora Guild: Broken English And Satin Angora At MN Convention and Northern California Angora Guild: Results Of New Breed/New Variety Presentation After the first try failed, the 2nd try of the first showing was done at the 2011 convention at Indianapolis, the result of the Broken English Angora showing was again a disappointment, see Northern California Angora Guild: Broken Angora Presentation and Northern California Angora Guild: Broken Angora Presentation - Part II

The next record that I have about Broken English Angora presentation was in 2018 at the ARBA convention at E. Springfield, MA, COD holders are Nichole Wilson, Lynn Wilson and Debbie McComick. By then, the COD allows multiple breeders listed on the same certificate. See photos and reports on:

2020 convention was supposed to be held at Harrisburg, PA but due to COVID, the convention was canceled. The second try of the second showing was done at the 2021 convention at Louisville, KY. I don't have any photos but heard the result was a fail due to "inconsistency". After attending 33 conventions consecutively, I made the decision not to risk my life in a crowded event during the COVID, and later decided not to fly myself and my rabbits to faraway locations due to the difficulty of airline travel after COVID. Sorry that there isn't any post on our blog to show what happened.

A new COD has been taken out in November 2024 by Andrea Evans, Linda Hibbert, Graham Thomas, Kathy Thomas and Kjirsten Thomas. According to the rule listed in the Standard of Perfection, there is a 2 year waiting period after the COD is granted before the team can attempt the first showing. The team is hard at work, hopefully we will see a successful presentation in 2027. Let's give the team our support and encouragement.

Note: If you are interested in the history of broken Satin Angora presentation, go to our blog and put "Broken Satin Angora" on the upper left to search, you'll see many photos and reports. The broken Satin Angora presentation started in the mid 1990s, many breeders tried and was eventually passed in 2019 at the convention at Reno, NV. The broken French Angora presentation passed in 1993 at the convention in Tacoma, WA by Carol Kerris, all showings were good, no fail along the way. I witnessed the success but did not have a camera on hand to take photos.

#### Vet Corner: Pregnancy Toxemia (Ketosis) in Rabbits

Pregnancy Toxemia, also known as Ketosis, is a significant metabolic disease in domestic rabbits, particularly affecting pregnant does in their late gestation period, as well as post-parturient and pseudopregnant does. This condition arises from a combination of high nutritional demands and factors that limit adequate food intake, leading to an energy deficit and subsequent metabolic complications.

#### **Understanding Pregnancy Toxemia**

Pregnancy Toxemia is a multifactorial disorder involving anorexia, gastrointestinal stasis, hepatic lipidosis, and a mismatch in energy requirements and nutritional status. A common contributing factor is gastric trichobezoir, or hairballs in the stomach, which hinder the rabbit's ability to consume enough feed to meet its energy needs. When food intake falls short, stored body fat is mobilized to compensate for the energy deficit. This process generates fatty acids that are metabolized into acetic acid. However, when the carbohydrate-metabolizing pathways cannot fully process the acetic acid, it is converted into ketone bodies. These ketones exit the body through urine and expired air, often giving the affected rabbits' breath a distinct acetone smell. Accumulation of fat in the liver leads to hepatic lipidosis, and the elevated ketone levels trigger metabolic issues such as acidosis, which can impair cellular energy and affect the brain, potentially resulting in coma and death.

Hypoglycemia is a hallmark of Pregnancy Toxemia due to the inadequate energy supply, leading to depleted blood glucose levels. This condition can affect rabbits of varying body conditions—both obese and underfed—as well as prolific does and healthy rabbits on balanced diets. Factors such as sudden feed transitions, stress, fasting during pregnancy, improper nutrition, hereditary predisposition, and gastric trichobezoir also contribute to the disease.

#### **Clinical Signs and Diagnosis**

Pregnancy Toxemia manifests either as sudden acute death or as a progression of symptoms over one to five days. Affected rabbits may present with various signs, including depression, weakness, anorexia, dyspnea (difficulty breathing), acetone odor on the breath, incoordination, convulsions, and coma. Owners often report that the affected does are near kindling, have just kindled, or have spontaneously aborted undeveloped fetuses. Diagnosing Pregnancy Toxemia typically relies on clinical history and observable symptoms, as diagnostic testing may not always be performed due to financial or logistical constraints.

#### **Treatment and Prognosis**

Treatment focuses on stabilizing the rabbit and addressing the energy deficit through supportive care. Initial steps include warming the hypothermic doe and administering fluid therapy with dextrose 5% (glucose) to manage hypoglycemia and dehydration. Oral honey may also be used as a glucose supplement. Calcium supplementation is provided parenterally or orally if hypocalcemia is present.

Nutritional support is vital and may involve syringe feeding, nasogastric or gastronomy tubes, with commercial formulas such as Oxbow Critical Care or Lafeber Emeraid. Prokinetic drugs like metoclopramide are used to address gastrointestinal stasis. If the doe stabilizes, oxytocin may be administered to induce labor, or a cesarean section may be considered. Unfortunately, the prognosis is generally poor, as many affected does fail to respond to treatment. However, spontaneous abortion of fetuses has been associated with improved outcomes.

#### **Prevention Strategies**

A local breeder presented three pregnant does approximately one year old and in their last week of gestation with a history of depression, weakness, poor appetite to no appetite and poor water intake, decreased urine output and small scant feces that started several days ago. Due to Covid-19 Pandemic, feed availability has been inconsistent here in the islands and had no choice but to abruptly switch feed to what was only available at that time. Shortly after breeding the three does, feed was abruptly changed from a 16% alfalfabased pellet diet to an 18% alfalfa-based diet with no transition time. The first doe seemed to be breathing rapidly and her breath smelled "sweet". She also seems to hop around the cage like she's drunk. The second doe was depressed and weak. Blood-tinged fluid from her vulva was noted on physical. The third doe was depressed and weak. On physical examination of all three does, they were all overweight and fetuses were easily palpable in the abdomen.

Diagnostic testing was not performed on these rabbits because owner declined. Based on history and clinical findings, pregnancy toxemia was suspected in all three does because of the abrupt feed change with no transition time from a 16% alfalfa-based pellet diet to an 18% alfalfa-based diet about three weeks ago. Supportive care was started immediately with fluid therapy, glucose supplementation (honey given orally), and syringe feeding of Oxbow Critical Care. Owner declined hospitalization and took all three does home to continue treatment. Owner called and reported the following day that Doe #1 was found dead in her cage and Doe #2 and Doe #3 were still weak, lethargic, and not eating or drinking anything.

Doe #2 had more blood-tinged fluid in cage tray and several aborted undeveloped fetuses. Doe #3 was quiet and not moving around much. After a few weeks have passed, owner called to update and report that Doe #2 is doing good and is already rebred. She was down for several days after aborting her litter and started to eat, drink, urinate, and defecate normally. Doe #3 continued to have poor appetite, water intake, decreased urine output and very small scant feces. She kindled normally but the litter of kits expired because she didn't produce milk to feed them. Few days after she kindled, her appetite, water intake, urine output, and defecation were normal. She was also rebred after two weeks of recovery.

# Creative Cooks By Sandy Tsukiyama

Summer's here & it's time for cookouts and picnics. This month I'm sharing two types of marinade that are very popular among the multicultural community in Hawaii where we eat outdoors year 'round.

One is the teriyaki sauce that my grandmother used. The other is a mainstay of the Asian-Spanish cuisine of the Philippines, Adobo, typically for braising chicken and pork.

Use either of these sauces to marinate a fryer rabbit overnight, then grill or smoke to your preference.

Aloha, Sandy

1 large clove garlic

#### Teriyaki Marinade

½ C. Soy sauce (Kikkoman Brand preferred)
 1 tablespoon sake
 3 tablespoons sugar
 1 teaspoon fresh ginger root or ginger powder

Blend together and marinate rabbit in a Ziploc bag, turning every few hours.

#### Filipino Adobo

½ C. Soy sauce

½ C. white or rice vinegar

4 cloves garlic

1 teaspoon black peppercorns.

3 bay leaves

Blend well and marinate marinate rabbit in a Ziploc bag, turning every few hours.
